






"Open-Poker" Simulation on the Future of Syria in the Aftermath of the US Withdrawal

IDC's Lauder School of Government and the Maxwell School's Master of Public Administration and International Relations at Syracuse University held a joint on-line simulation focusing on the regional and international implications of US troop withdrawal from Syria. Taking place over the course of three months, parallel Syracuse-IDC student teams explored the perspectives and interests of the actors they represented in the simulation, and implemented strategy decisions in light of the simulation's opening scenario and two subsequent scenarios deriving from the actors' decisions. Students worked on the construction of policy options and the examination of alternatives presented by others. The term "open poker" stems from the fact that the entire process was conducted with complete transparency between the actors. Each team was also assigned a Maxwell or IDC expert mentor with whom they communicated on-line for expert advice.

On May 15, 2019, the simulation culminated in a joint on-line round-table Skype session between the IDC and Maxwell participants. During the session, a representative from each team reported the team's main political/strategic achievements in the simulation. In addition, analysis of the scenario and simulation events were presented by: Dean of the Lauder School of Government, Prof. Boaz Ganor; Former Deputy Director of the Mossad, Mr. Naftali Granot; Associate Director, Student Services at Maxwell, Josh Kennedy; Deputy Executive Director of the ICT at IDC, Stevie Weinberg. Written comments and analysis by former United States Deputy Secretary of State Jim Steinberg were conveyed by Joshua Kennedy.


TRIVALENT Consortium 3rd General Assembly, Rome, June 26-28, 2019
The three days General Assembly at the Roma Tre Univ. included several sessions: Radicalisation
Patterns and IT Early Detection Tools; Cooperation Between LEAs and Civil Society & IT
Communication Tool; LEAs New Skills & Train-The-Trainers.

Dr. Ely Karmon, the ICT coordinator for the project, participated actively at the Assembly. During the Plenary Session and deliberations, he presented some proposals to improve the dissemination of the consortium material. He also invited the consortium members to participate at ICT's September 2019 conference, and it seems that this year the participation will be quite important.



On 13 May 2019, Adv. Deborah-Housen Couriel (Research Associate and Adjunct Professor, ICT, IDC Herzliya and Fellow, Interdisciplinary Cyber Research Center (ICRC), Tel Aviv University) presented the International Cyber Terrorism Regulation Project (ICTRP) and its preliminary findings during a private workshop hosted by the Global Research Network on Terrorism and Technology (GRNTT) led by the Royal United Services Institute (RUSI) in London, UK. The network, which brings partners from around the world, is supported by the Global Internet Forum to Counter Terrorism (GIFCT), an industry-led initiative comprising Facebook, Google, Microsoft and Twitter. The session surrounded the theme of "Law and Regulation" and gathered researchers, government officials, and representatives from civil society organizations and tech companies.

In addition, Lt. Col. (Res.) Uri Ben Yaakov (Senior Researcher and Director for Development, The International Institute for Counter-Terrorism) took part in a research panel on "Regulation, Response, and Partnerships" during a GRNTT meeting organized by the Brookings Institute in the United States. Lt. Col (Res.) Ben Yaakov addressed key aspects and findings of the ICTRP project. Additionally, the ICTRP website (www.ictrp.org) was launched. The content of the website is being regularly developed with new sources and updates from the field. Most notably, the first phase of the research was presented in a policy paper that addressed the following research question: What are the best ways to encourage cooperation among relevant state and non-state stakeholders in creating regulation to fight exploitation of online platforms for terrorist purposes? The policy paper is expected to be published in the upcoming months.



Experts at the International Institute for Counter-Terrorism Discuss: The Significance of the Rise in Terrorist Attacks in the West Bank

In recent months, we have witnessed an increase in the number of terrorist attacks in the area of the West Bank. On the surface it appears as if there is relative calm in this arena in terms of security as a result of ongoing security measures, preventative measures by the Shin Bet and security forces, and existing cooperation with the Palestinian security forces. At a meeting of the Foreign Affairs and Defense Committee of the Knesset held at the end of December 2017, the head of the Israel Security Agency (Shin Bet or ISA), Nadav Argaman, noted that approximately 400 terrorist attacks were foiled in 2017, including 13 suicide attacks, 8 kidnapping attacks, 94 self-sacrificing attacks (attacks likely resulting in the death of the terrorist by the security forces), and 1,100 potential attacks by lone terrorists were thwarted.



However, in recent months there seems to have been an increase in the number of terrorist attacks in this arena. Data presented by the ISA indicates that approximately 64 attacks took place in August, 70 in September, 95 in October and 114 in November. To date, no official data has been published for the month of December, but the trend appears to be continuing.

For the purpose of this document, we gathered leading experts from ICT on the West Bank, and inquired about their analysis of the significance of this rise, and if and how it can be stopped.

Experts at the International Institute for Counter-Terrorism (ICT) Discuss: Regional Challenges in Light of the US Withdrawal from Syria

In December 2018, US President, Donald Trump, announced the withdrawal of American forces from Syria. His decision was made following a conversation with Turkish President Erdoğan, and in light of his assessment that the Islamic State has been completely defeated. The withdrawal of troops will take approximately three months, during which time 2,000 US soldiers stationed in Syria, mainly in Kurdish areas in the north and northeast, will be evacuated. Criticism of the president's decision at home and abroad has not caused him to change his decision but the US did stress that it would continue to act against the Islamic State from its bases in the region. Recently, in addition to the claim that a plan is being formulated to maintain a US ground force in the Al-Tanf area², the Senate called on Trump (February 2019) to reexamine the decision to withdraw from Syria and delay it for the time being, as the move could lead to a renewed strengthening of the Islamic State³.

The Western coalition, led by the US and with the participation of British, French, German and other forces, has been operating against the Islamic State since the end of 2014 - in the first stage from the air, and later by means of ground forces located in strategic areas as well. These forces were engaged in assisting, training and consulting the local forces fighting against the Islamic State - mainly Kurdish fighters and Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF) soldiers⁴.

In the beginning of 2016, an American helicopter landing pad was built in northeast Syria in addition to the American base Al-Tanf, near the border triangle between Syria, Jordan and Iraq. This area serves as a land corridor from Iran through Iraq, Syria and Lebanon⁵. The American presence in the region, which is also based on Kurdish forces, does not allow the operational use of this corridor by Iran and its allies.

Global Alert

The Rationality of Modern Islamist Terrorism and the Challenge to the Liberal Democratic World

Boaz Ganor

Many associate terrorism with irrational behavior and believe only lunatics could perpetuate such horrific acts. *Global Alert* debunks this myth by anatomizing the rationale behind modern terrorism. It draws a distinct picture of its root and instrumental causes and plots the different stages of a terrorist attack, from indoctrination and recruitment to planning, preparation, and launch.

Global Alert also exposes the measured exploitation of democratic institutions by terrorists to further their goals. Despite its strong capabilities and extensive resources, the modern liberal-democratic state is nevertheless subject to the rules of war, which partially restrict the state's ability to operate and maneuver. Boaz Ganor shows how terrorist organizations exploit these values to paralyze or neutralize the states they oppose. In outlining this new "hybrid" terrorist organization and its activity in both the military-terrorist arena and the political-welfare arena, Ganor advances an international doctrine for governing military operations between state and nonstate actors as part of a new type of armed conflict termed "multidimensional warfare."

BOAZ GANOR is the founder and executive director of the International Institute for Counter-Terrorism (ICT), the Ronald Lauder Chair for Counter-Terrorism, and the dean of the Lauder School of Government, Diplomacy, and Strategy at the Interdisciplinary Center (IDC) Herzliya. He has served as an advisor and/or a consultant to the Israeli Counter-Terrorism Bureau, the Israeli National Security Council, and the Israeli Ministry of Defense.


